

y family and I recently concluded a flight that's been on our **L**bucket list for a long time. About 300 nautical miles northeast of Galt Airport, along the Upper Peninsula of Michigan lies a small gemstone of a destination, Mackinac Island, located in the Straits of Mackinac that serve to link Lake Huron and Lake Michigan.

Transportation on the island takes one back in time. No cars are allowed on the island except for a few emergency vehicles. The choices for transportation are either a bicycle or a horse drawn buggy.

Most people get to the island via the scheduled ferry service that runs from either St. Ignace or Mackinac City, Michigan. Others come by privately owned boats or airplanes.

Mackinac Island Airport sits toward the middle of the island. The single runway is 3500' long, and has instrument approach procedures for arrivals from both directions. The airstrip is in excellent condition and a friendly airport manager staffs the small terminal and ramp area. The ramp and adjacent grass area offers room to tie down a good number of airplanes, though no hangars, fuel, or maintenance services

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
are available. A parking fee of \$12.50 per day is accessed to single engine airplanes. Across the bay in St. Ignace an airport called the Mackinac County Airport provides full services.

When you arrive at Mackinac Island Airport, horse drawn taxi carriages can transport you to your accommodation. It's best to call ahead and prearrange a carriage to meet you at the airport at your arrival time, as the taxis have to travel out of the main town which approximately 25 minutes from the airport. Taxi fare from the airport into downtown is about \$7.50 per person. It's a very peaceful and relaxing two-mile ride through some beautiful wooded paths. If you're up for it, you can also hike into town.

There's abundance an

0 kts 6°M 214°M things to see and do on the island. Rented bicycles is a popular way to check out the beautiful scenery and historic sites around the island. Rental bikes are available all over town for an average cost of about \$10.00/hour.

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breakfast establishments. The legendary hotel on the island is known as the Grand Hotel, a historic, elegant hotel that has been named one of the top 25 hotels in the world. Visitors are welcome to tour the inside of the Grand Hotel for an admission price of \$10.00 per person. After 6 pm, a formal dress code is required for entry to the hotel. The Grand is well worth a visit while you are on the island.

My family and I stayed at a quaint and comfortable bed and breakfast called the Metivier Inn. It was located on Market Street about a block back from the main street that runs through downtown Mackinac Island. The rooms were clean and quiet and the hospitality offered by the innkeepers was amazing.

There's a bounty of shops, restaurants, and bars in the town. Mackinac Island Fudge may be the island's most famous product, with numerous

fudge shops claiming unique recipes and offering free samples.

We enjoyed dinning at several excellent restaurants. One of our favorites was called the Kingston Kitchen that had amazing Jamaican fare. The owner and chef was a gentleman named Shawn, a native of Jamaica. He came to our table to make sure we were delighted with his food.

For night life, there are a number of options on and around Main Street. A bar called the "Pink Pony" located in the Chippewa Hotel on Main St. offered a beautiful view of the water, and had some relaxing live entertainment. The signature beverage at the Pony is a pink rum runner. I had no problem falling asleep after consuming this beverage!

Another place that is more of a

"local" establishment is a bar called the Mustang Lounge with popular fare such as hamburgers and pizza.

Overall, you'll not go wrong with any of the establishments on the island. You'll find the local folks and service friendly and attentive. I often use the Trip Advisor app when I travel around the country to get a sense of the quality of various places, and it's hard to find a sub-par place on Mackinac Island!

Mackinac Island is an exceptional destination. There are a few websites will help you plan your trip. It's well worth the journey to head that way!



Flight notes: On departure from Mackinac Island, the weather was IFR along most of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, so we ended up flying along the eastern coast of Lake Michigan to get back to Galt, with a fuel stop in Muskegon.

Our trip took us around the entire

circumference of Lake Michigan. The

sites along the way were really enjoyable. The skyline of Chicago and the southern rim of Lake Michigan presents quite a change in scenery from that of the northern rim. Total flight time to do the circle route is about 7.5 hours in our Piper Archer. Times would be about the same in a Cessna 172 or similar general aviation aircraft. If we had been able to return back along the UP, the flight time could have been reduced by about an hour.



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EAA Chapter 932 Scholarship Committee Announces

2020 Ray Aviation Flight Training Scholarship Recipient

The EAA Chapter 932 Scholarship Committee is pleased to introduce this year's recipient of a 2020 Ray Aviation Flight Training Scholarship, Michael Karm.



Michael is a 17 year old student at McHenry East. One year ago, after a chat with former fellow high school student and pilot, Gretchen Thennes, Michael began exploring the path to a flying career. He researched what it would take to become a pilot, got a job

at the local Target and saved his money to open a

flight training account with JB Aviation at Galt. In January of this year, he began his flight training.

Michael was among five applicants for the 2020 Ray Aviation Scholarship administrated by EAA932. Each candidate presented unique qualifications, making for a difficult decision by our chapter's committee members. The chapter submitted Michael's application to the EAA National Headquarters in Oshkosh at the end of June. His scholarship was approved just before the Independence Day weekend.

Michael's goal is to complete his initial private pilot flight training by his 18th birthday this fall. After that he plans to apply for Purdue's 3-year accelerated aviation program. EAA Chapter 932 is so very pleased to help support Michael as he embarks on his path.

A little info about the Ray Scholarship...

The Ray Aviation Flight Training Scholarship is a unique full-scholarship opportunity for primary flight training. EAA Chapter 932 is able to offer this scholarship on a "approval" basis thanks to the Experimental Aircraft Association in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Our chapter's goal is to bring forward and support a student to certificate completion.

The *Ray Aviation Scholars* program provides up to \$10,000 scholarships to young people who are seeking to learn to fly. The Ray Foundation has provided \$1.2 million to fund the scholarship program, which aims to improve the flight training success rate from the current industry standards of 20 percent to 80 percent for student pilots. Local EAA chapters are responsible for identifying youth for the Ray Aviation Scholarship program and mentoring them through flight training. The Ray Foundation is furthering the legacy of James Ray, an EAA lifetime member who was dedicated to aviation and youth education.

The scholarship is designed to support a flight student through both written and practical segments of flight training that are part of successful FAA pilot certification. In the first year of the program, 105 scholars were awarded flight training scholarships. EAA 932 member, Jeff Boyack, was one of the first few scholars to receive the Ray Scholarship and complete his goal to become a pilot in 2019. Today, Jeff continues his aviation studies at Liberty University.

EAA chapters play a critical role in the success of the Ray Aviation Scholarship program. Chapters interested in participating must be prequalified by the EAA through an application process. If selected, they mentor and support the scholarship recipient throughout their flight training journey. Once selected as a Ray Aviation Scholarship Fund participant, candidates also commit to volunteer service with the local EAA chapter.

EAA Chapter 932 is one of 900 local chapters of the Experimental Aircraft Association, the world's largest organization for recreational flying. It meets at Galt Airport on the second Saturday of the month. More information on EAA Chapter 932 activities and scholarship opportunities is available at EAA932.org.

Planes on Posts

On the way to Mackinac Island, Arnie Quast and family made a quick stop at the Delta County Airport in Escanaba, MI.

Being the dedicated Chapter President and avid newsletter supporter that Arnie is, he keeps a sharp eye out for new *Planes On Posts* wherever he flys. I'm sure he spotted this F-84F as he overflew over the area and landed specifically to take this photo. That's dedication! (Arnie assures me that the landing had nothing at all to do with fuel and/or bathrooms.)

The F-84F is an early turbojet that evolved from the straight-wing F-84 and first flew in June 1950. It was a design that was frought with problems: poor takeoff performance that ate up 7,500 feet of runway on hot days, a nasty accelerated stall pitch-up characteristic that often lead to impossible spin recoveries below 10,000 feet, engine flame-outs in heavy rain or snow, and finally corrosion issues.

Deliveries were delayed until 1954 and the active duty phaseout of it's use began shortly afterward. It begins to sound as though a display post might be the safest place for these airplanes to be.

Most of the aircraft were originally used by the Tactical Air Command as a ground support fighter bomber. Republic built 2,112 F-84Fs while General Motors fabricated 599 more. Of these, 1,301 were delivered to NATO air forces.
